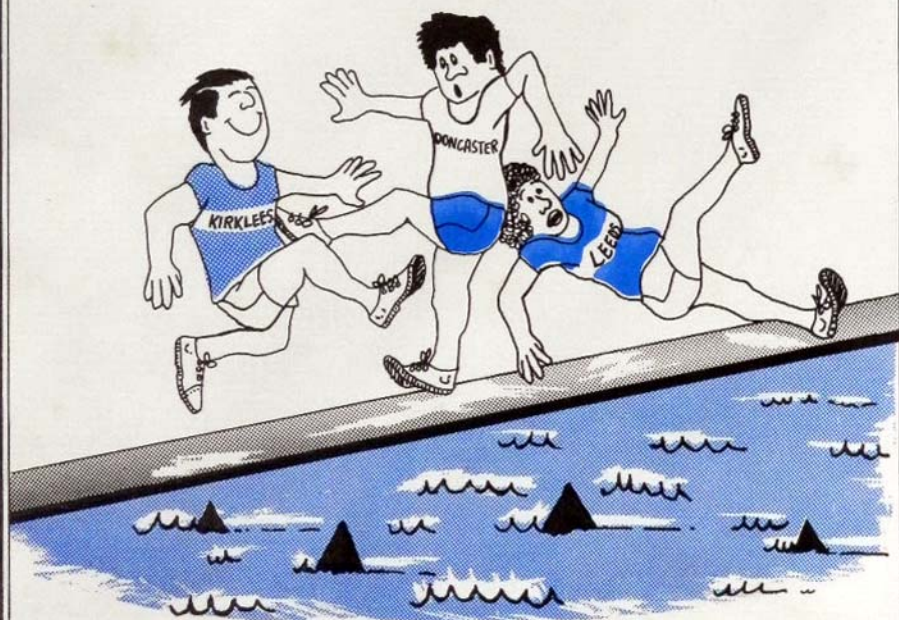

EDDIE WARING

Eddie joined the programme in 1966 and has vast experience of "Knock-out" recordings all over Europe.

He has been a B.B.C. personality since TV came to the North in 1951, becoming a well-known name in covering Rugby League.

Born in Dewsbury, Eddie played soccer, Rugby Union, Rugby League and was a wrestler, too.

A globe-trotter, he has made seven trips round the world and appeared on TV in Australia, New Zealand and the U.S.

Eddie usually gives a special blow-by-blow account of the mini-marathon contest, which can be a vital tie-breaker in a tight contest. "For me," he says, "the programme really comes alive when we go into Europe. The atmosphere is electric, the competition intense, and yet so enjoyable. It's an exciting show to do."

Stuart Hall, who made his "Knock-out" debut in 1972, presents "Look North", the B.B.C. North West weeknight TV magazine programme in Manchester, and makes frequent appearances on the network in "Nationwide".

Lancashire-born, he first broadcast in 1958 as a radio contributor in "Sports Spotlight". He has reported on soccer, cricket, tennis, motor racing and motor cycling, as well as current affairs.

His great interests are football, fast cars and antique clocks. Perhaps the clocks reign supreme – he loves their sense of continuity.

Married the same year he started broadcasting – 1958 – Stuart has two teenage children. His home in Glossop, Derbyshire, is crammed with antique clocks, Victorian furniture, bronzes and old portraits.

He sees "Knock-out" as essentially a "fun show" and is determined to make it as entertaining as possible for competitors and viewers.

Producer

Stockport-born Cecil Korer joins the series as producer this year, but he is by no means unfamiliar with the programme. He worked on the first two series in 1966 and 1967 as an assistant producer. Since then, he's been involved with such shows as "Children Talking" as director, and producer of such quizzes as "Password" and "Ask the Family".

In recent years he has worked in London, but returned to the North in the Autumn of 1975 to take over "Knock-out" from Barney Colehan and develop other programme ideas from Leeds.

He has worked on the production team of such other long-running favourites as "Top of the Pops" and "The Good Old Days".



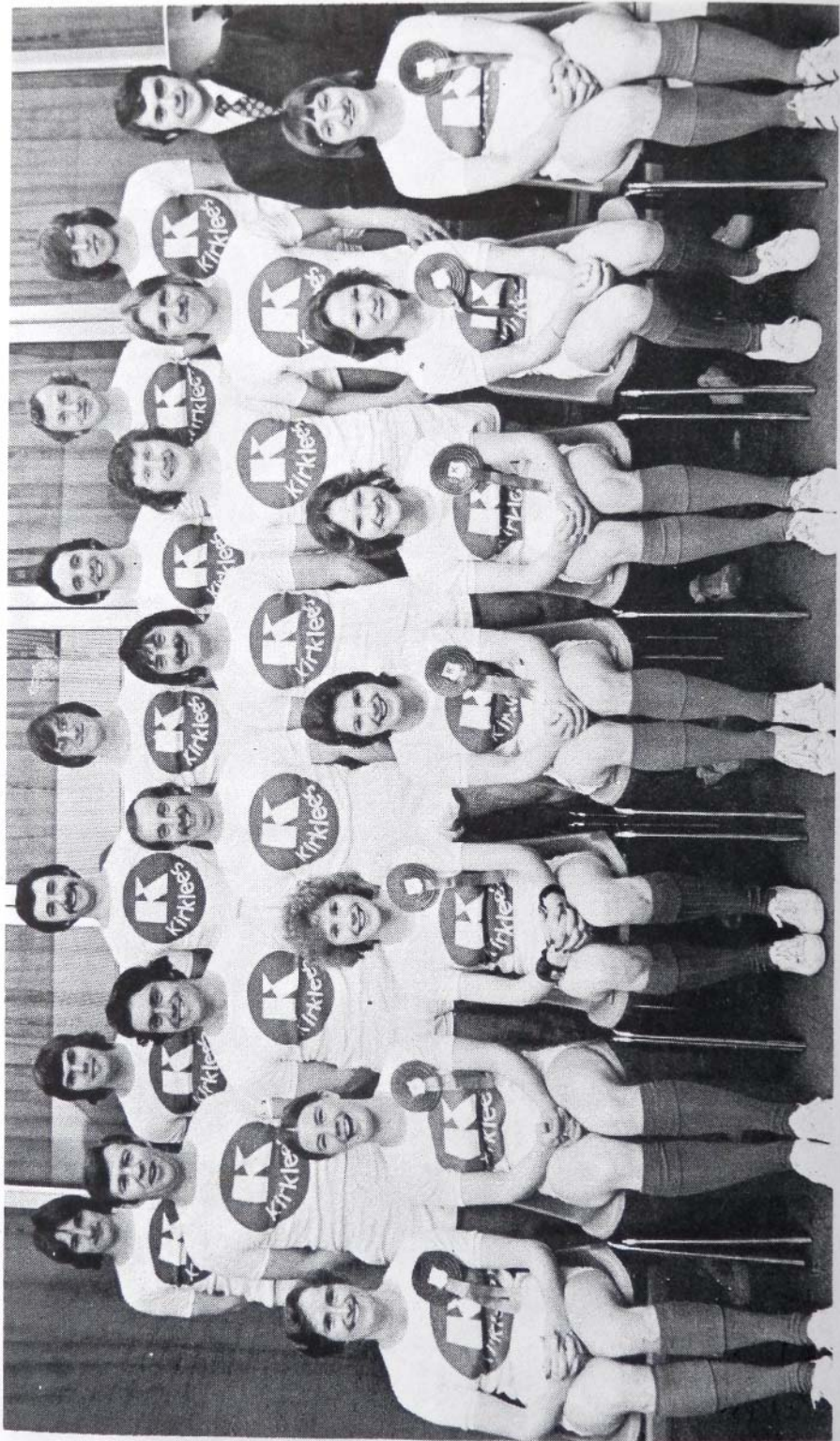
ARTHUR ELLIS

Kirklees is one of the new names on the map following the national re-organisation of local government in 1974. It's not the name of any one town but of one of the largest Metropolitan Boroughs in England with a population greater than those of some counties.

Inside the Kirklees boundary are the heavy woollen towns of Batley and Dewsbury, there are Cleckheaton and Mirfield, the textile and engineering centre of Huddersfield, the Colne Valley, the Holme Valley and many rural areas, including part of the Peak District National Park.

Incidentally, the name of Kirklees is derived from Kirklees Priory, north of Huddersfield.

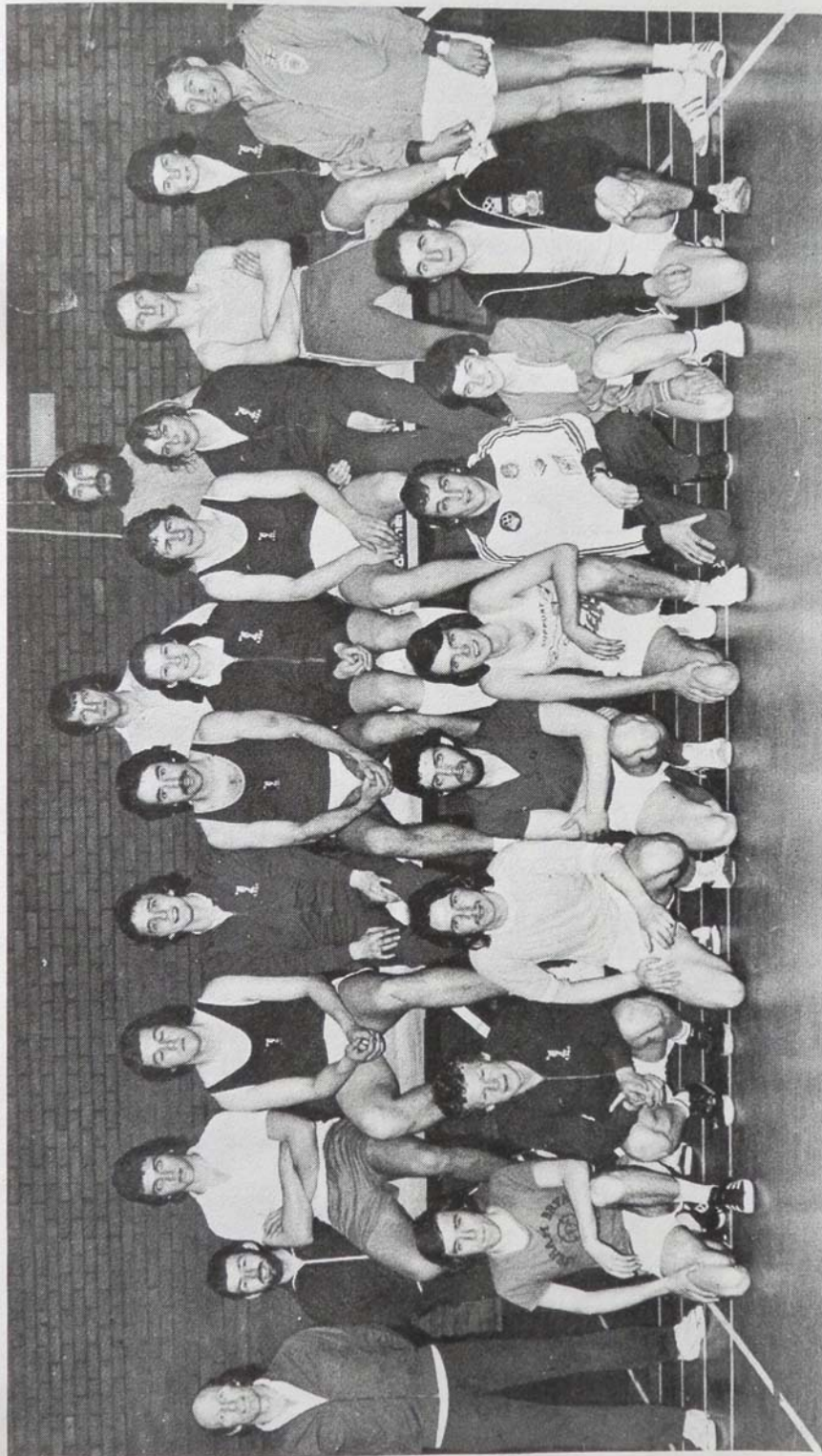

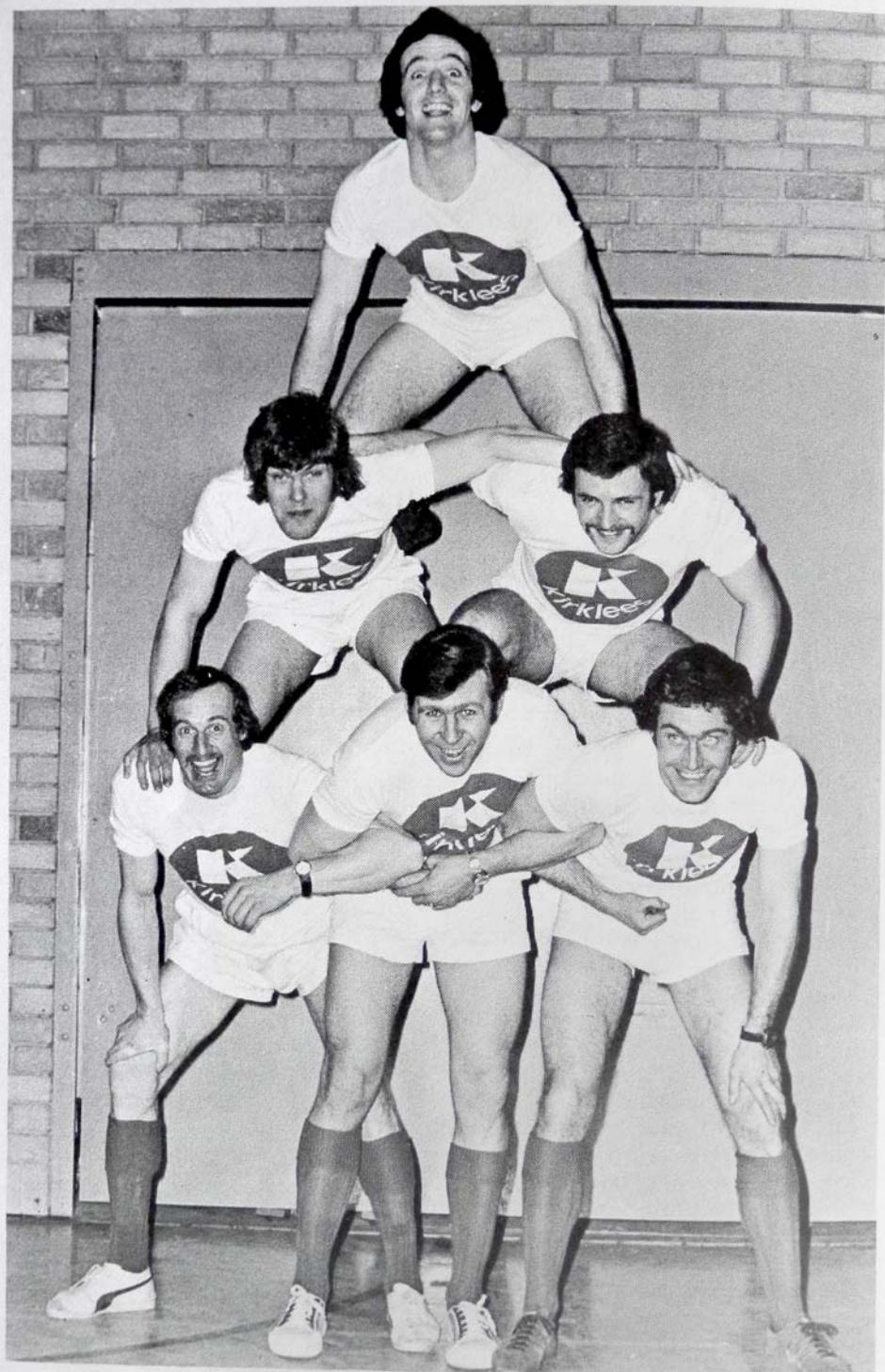

'IN THE RING'

3 Teams/1 Heat
1 Male; 1 Female

At whistle 1 man and 1 girl from same team progress down course, stepping into maximum number of air filled rings as they can. Winning team will be the one with most rings in time limit.

'OTTLE BOTTLE'

2 Teams/2 Heats
2 Males; 2 Females

One girl throws empty hot water bottles to 1 man and 1 girl standing on revolve centre section, filling them with water from the hanging pails, whilst the revolve is operated by 2 men from the opposing team. When the bottle is filled it is thrown to a man from the team playing who pours the water into a container for scoring. Winning team will be the one with the most water within time limit. Teams change roles for second heat.

'GOAL GROPING'

3 Teams/1 Heat
2 Males; 1 Female

One man wearing football boots and socks is in a costume in which he cannot see. A girl for his team audibly directs him where and when to kick a football passed to him by a man positioned adjacent to the goal area supplying the man kicking with fresh or returned footballs. Winning team will be the one who has scored most goals within time limit.

'ANOTHER FINE MESS'

2 Teams/2 Heats
1 Male/1 Female – Playing
2 Males – Operating Revolve

One man and 1 girl armed with paint and brushes stand on the centre of the revolve, painting certain faces of four suspended shapes, whilst the opposing team operate the revolve. The winning team will be the one with most correctly painted faces on each shape, within time limit. Second Heat – second team play.

'BROLLEY BALL'

3 Teams/1 Heat
2 Males; 3 Females

One girl takes a ball from an area supplying all teams playing and, climbing on to her allotted area of an air tube, throws the ball, aiming over a bar, so that it lands in the centre of four opened umbrellas being held by 2 men and 2 girls from her team. Thus caught, the ball is transported over the course and tipped into a bay allocated for that team. The winning team will be the one with most balls correctly caught and deposited in their bay.

'BRIMFULL'

2 Teams/2 Heats
4 Males; 2 Females

One man stands on a float in the centre of the pool, throwing balls into brim of a hat on top of profiled figures, being held ready to catch the balls by 3 men and 2 girls from his team, each standing on a podium. Winning team will be the one with most balls caught correctly, and retained in hat brim for the duration of the game which runs 'til time limit.

Second heat – second team play.

'GETTING HIGH'

3 Teams/1 Heat
5 Males; 2 Females

One man stands on discs with hand lines attached. He walks down course to 6 members of his team, 4 men and 2 girls, standing on blocks. They each place two circular discs under his feet, on top of the ones already piled there, one going under the left foot, one under the right. The man then walks to the finish line without losing any discs or falling off them.

The winning team will be the first one across finishing line with maximum number of discs under each foot.

MARATHON 1: 'POST THE BALL'

3 Teams/3 Heats
2 Males; 1 Female

A man sits at each end of a rotating see-saw. A girl standing on a podium throws a ball, taken from a box, to the man sitting nearest to her on the see-saw. He rolls it down centre channel to the man sitting at the opposite end, who has to place each ball on top of a number of poles. The team positioning most balls in shortest time win.

MARATHON 2: 'GIVE ME A RING'

3 Teams/3 Heats
2 Males; 1 Female

One man and 1 girl sit at opposite ends of a rotating see-saw. A man standing on a podium throws hoops, taken from a box, to the man sitting on the see-saw. He throws them across see-saw to the girl who catching them places each one over the pegs at the top of a number of poles.

The team correctly positioning most hoops in shortest time wins.

Entertainment prior to this afternoon's "It's A Knock-out" programme is provided by the Huddersfield Pipe Band.
