

# It's a (Bigger, Brighter) Knockout 1966-1976

#### The B.B.C. give details of the new series

"It's a Knockout is 10 years old. To celebrate, the new series will be launched in style back where it all began, on the sea front at Morecambe.

There will be more shows than ever before with 21 towns competing to win a place in the International round. Host town for the British heat of 'Jeux sans Frontieres' will be Leeds and, as it is our turn to stage the Grand Final this year, Blackpool is the location for the show which is expected to have an audience of around 200 million.

The very first It's a Knockout was broadcast live from Morecambe sands in 1966 and nearly ended in disaster. The tide came in during the closing minutes and the cameramen were up to their knees in water by the end.

This time, the show will be done on the promenade.

There is a strong North v. South flavour to the contest, with the Midlands and Scotland also staking a claim.

Three towns take part in each of the seven 'domestic' heats, with the winner from each programme representing Britain in the international series which includes teams from France, Belgium, Germany, Italy, Holland and Switzerland.

For the first time this year, the seven successful British towns will also participate in a special All-Winners programme to be recorded on neutral ground at Charnock Richard, Lancashire, for the Radio Times trophy.

There will also be another all-star celebrity edition following the success of last year's charity-raising event, and a Cup Final special with teams of supporters from the two clubs who win through to Wembley.

Cecil Korer takes over as producer this year from Barney Colehan, who launched the show. However, Barney, who retired from the BBC in January, will still act as adviser on the series.

'My ambition is to put more fun back into the show,' says Cecil. 'I want to revive the original concept of the series as a seaside fun show with lots of fun. In recent years, it has become too competitive and serious.

'The European versions have often been crazier than ours and now we are importing some of that flavour with daft props and costumes.

'The bonus for the teams will be that they will have the chance to take part in European-style games before Jeux sans Frontieres actually starts. British teams haven't performed so well lately. The changes we are making should alter that.'

Here's a run down of the series.

The nation-wide contest starts on April 4 with Morecambe playing host to Blackpool and Liverpool.

On April 11, Hanley Park at Stoke-on-Trent is the venue when Birmingham and Tamworth challenge the home team.

A week later on April 18, Cirencester and Newbury lay seige at picturesque Sudeley Castle, in Gloucestershire, used as a location for The Pallisers, against a local team from Winchcombe.

Yorkshire enters the fray on May 2 when Kirklees, Doncaster and Leeds meet at the Princess Mary Playing Fields, Cleckheaton.

Harlow are at home to Thurrock (Grays) and Lee Valley, at the Sportscentre on May 9.

The Boating Lake on the seafront at Redcar will be the scene of a contest between the home team and Carlisle and Durham on May 16.

The domestic series winds up on May 23. Stirling University are the hosts when the town takes on Edinburgh and Linlithgow."

# **<u>"It's a Knockout"</u>** - the target is the "Jeux Sans Frontieres" Gold Trophy!

"It's a Knockout" was born in the North by way of the B.B.C.'s "Top Town" contests of the 'fifties and it has grown into an Olympian event watched by 15 million viewers in Britain, and via Eurovision, 150 million more in Europe.

In this series of "It's a Knockout" there will be seven British Heats each with three teams. There will also be an All Winners Programme, followed by seven International Heats plus a Grand Final.

Of the towns selected for the British Heats seven will be Host towns and fourteen will play away. The winners of each British Heat will go forward to a special All Winners Programme and compete for the Radio Times Trophy, which they will retain for a year.

Each winner of a British Heat will also qualify to represent their town, and Great Britain, in one of the International Heats competing against six other countries from Europe.

As the competition progresses into Europe, the British Teams aims are two-fold. Firstly, of course, to win the International Heat and a Silver "Jeux Sans Frontieres" trophy; Secondly to gain the highest possible place and as many points as possible in the heat. It will be the best placed British Team, or the highest scoring if two are similary placed, who will go forward to the "Jeux Sans Frontieres" Final, where a Gold Trophy is the prize for the winning team.

# "Knockout" People

"Knockout's inimitable duo, Stuart Hall and Eddie Waring, are the commentators again, and former international soccer referee Arthur Ellis and Mike Swann are the British Referees.

# **Eddie Waring**



Eddie joined the programme in 1966 and has vast experience of Knockout recordings all over Europe.

He has been a top B.B.C. personality ever since TV came to the North in 1951, becoming a household name in covering Rugby League.

Born in Dewsbury, Eddie played Soccer, Rugby Union, Rugby League—and was a wrestler too.

A globe-trotter, he has made seven trips round the world and appeared on TV in Australia, New Zealand and the U.S.

Eddie usually gives a special blow-by-blow account of the mini-marathon contest, which can be a vital tie-breaker in a tight contest. "For me," he says, "the programme really comes alive when we go into Europe. The atmosphere is electric, the competition intense, and yet so enjoyable. It's an exciting show to do."

## **Stuart Hall**



Stuart Hall, who made his Knockout debut in 1972, presents Look North, the B.B.C. North West weeknight TV magazine programme in Manchester, and makes frequent appearances on the network in Nationwide.

A Lancashire lad, he first broadcast in 1958 as a radio contributor in Sports Spotlight. He has reported on soccer, cricket, tennis, motor racing and motor cycling, as well as current affairs.

His great loves are football, fast cars and antique clocks. Perhaps the clocks reign supreme—he loves their sense of continuity.

Married the same year he started broadcasting—1958— Stuart has two teenage children, Francesca and Daniel. His home in Glossop, Derbyshire, is crammed with antique clocks, Victorian furniture, bronzes and old portraits.

He sees Knockout as essentially a "fun show" and is determined to make it as entertaining as possible for competitors and viewers.

# **Cecil Korer**

#### Producer

Cecil joins the series as producer this year, but he is by no means unfamiliar with the programme. He worked on the first two series in 1966 and 1967 as an assistant producer. Since then, he's been involved with such shows as Children Talking as director, and producer of such quizes as Password and Ask The Family.

In recent years, he has worked in London, but returned to the North—he was born in Stockport—in the Autumn of 1975 to take over Knockout from Barney Colehan and develop other programme ideas from Leeds.

He has worked on the production team of such other long-running favourites as Top of the Pops and The Good Old Days, where he first established his working relationship with Barney.



## **Arthur Ellis**

#### Referee

Arthur Ellis, from Halifax, one of the best-known soccer referees in the world, has officiated in practically every country that plays first-class football.

He refereed World Cup ties and 73 internationals in his time, and became the first English referee to be awarded the Gold Badge of FIFA.

He now works as a brewery representative.

# "It's a Knockout" Games Order and Scoring

As you will see from the descriptions there are now seven games with a Marathon between each game.

The seventh game will be a "standing game" throughout the series and each week all teams will do the same game.

Note: Each week the score will be 3, 2, 1 points for first, second and third as for normal games.

The New Total Score if you win all games and win your Joker and the Marathon will be 27 points and the lowest you can score if you lose all games will be 11 points.

# The BBC's "Backroom Boys"

Behind the scenes, there's a dedicated team that the Knockout live audiences see going about their complex duties, but are discretely out of sight of the TV audiences.

The director is Geoff Wilson, who makes sure that the producer and engineers' efforts reach the screen in the way they were envisaged in the calm of the planning meetings.

Cecil Korer has the assistance of Alan Wright, who leads the full-time workers responsible for the months of advance preparation which go into the smooth running of the series.

Engineering manager Geoff Lomas ensures that all the complicated equipment functions correctly, and the stage managers, led by Bryan Chapman, can be seen racing backwards and forwards talking to the director's mobile control room, via 'walkie talkie' radios during the course of the recording.

#### **'FLYING FISH'**

Team members stated are those

#### 3 Teams / 1 Heat 1 male; 2 females

A man and girl are on roller-skates, linked together at their ankles and each carry a catching net to receive balls with streamers attached to them.

The balls are thrown through the open mouth of a fish hanging above the ground, by a girl from the same team, limited in her run up distance by an elastic line. After either the man or girl have caught a ball, they must deposit it in a container at the end of their track.

The winning team will be the one with most balls caught in time limit.

### 'HIGHBALL'

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GAME

#### 2 Teams / 1 Heat 1 male; 1 female

Advancing down a line of hoops, through which a football's passed, a man and girl carry a net between them on which a large ball is placed. If this ball falls off the net in course of negotiating the line of hoops they must return to the start, replace the ball and begin again.

Having reached the end of the line of hoops the big ball on the net is bounced up and over a bar, they have to catch it on the other side in the net. If missed the ball is to be replaced and they try again, each time bouncing it from the hoop line side of the bar.

## **'GETTING HOOKED'**



3 Teams / 1 Heat 4 males; 2 females

One girl and one man carry a girl seated on a suitable carrying plank. Two men carry a man seated on a suitable carrying plank.

The man on his plank, and the girl on hers hold walking sticks with the hooked end outwards, and advance towards each other. When they are close enough to link the ends of their hooked sticks the man then has to direct them all back through his starting hoop remaining hooked to the girl.

The winners will be the first team, man and girl correctly hooked, through their hoop.

# 'HEAVY WATER'

2 Teams / 2 Heats 1 male; 1 female A man and a girl each carry a plank on their heads on which is placed a tub containing water, the inside ends of the planks are linked by a short line. They both negotiate, side by side, a course of obstacles, stepping stones, foam blocks, a low tape and a ramp. When completed they turn around and return the same way to the start line, remove the tubs from their planks and empty

the water into transparent containers. Winners will be the team who have emptied the most water into their tubs after completing the course.

## 'BOUNCYCLETTE'

3 Teams / 3 Heats 3 males; 2 females Three men from the same team each ride a bicycle down an unevenly surfaced track. Between each cycle there are lines running between an attachment on the front of the frame. These must be kept reasonably taut, to retain a number of balls that are placed on them.

If a ball falls off, a girl, one on each side of the three tracks, can throw a replacement onto the lines although this must be carefully judged as this action may endanger the stability of the balls already retained on the lines. The winning team will be the quickest to complete the course, finishing with the same number of balls as they started with.

## 'THROW 'N' JUMP'

2 Teams / 2 Heats 3 Males; 2 females—Playing 2 males—Pushing Two girls, one each side of the revolve take a ball from a storage area, throw it, from behind a line, to two men, each one standing on a podium adjacent to the girls either side of the revolve. They must catch it and throw it into the basket that is strapped on the back of a man from their team who is kneeling on the centre of the revolve.

Two men from the opposing team operate the revolve. The arc that is swept by the arms cuts across the areas where the two men from the team busy throwing are standing-as the arm comes up to this podium the man must jump to avoid being removed by it, thereby decreasing his time for getting balls into the basket. Winning team will be the one who gets the most balls into their man's basket in the time limit. Teams swap roles for second heat.

## 'WELL STACKED'

3 Teams / 1 Heat 2 males: 2 females

Two girls load a quantity of fruit baskets piling them one upon another vertically, onto a plank carried by two men from the same team. When they are all loaded, the men progress down course to finish posts, each bursting a line of balloons with their feet.

The winning team will be the first back, with all their fruit baskets still piled high and having burst all the balloons.

## 'HEADS TOGETHER'

MARATHON

1 Team / 3 Heats 2 males: 2 females

Two men and one girl each wear a costume which prevents them seeing as they negotiate a course of markers constantly keeping a large ball sitting between the heads of their costumes, finishing by depositing it into a basket at the end of the course. They are directed by a girl from the same team who issues them with audible instructions.

Winning team will be quickest to complete entire course successfully, or retain ball between them for furthest distance-number of markers passed and not knocked over counts for scoring.

## **'BOUNCE AROUND'**



1 Team / 3 Heats 2 males: 2 females


Two men and two girls each wear a costume out of which they can see, although leg movement will possibly be restricted.

They negotiate same course of markers as used in Marathon 1, constantly retaining a large ball between the heads of the four costumes, finishing by depositing it into a basket at the end of the course.

Winning team will be quickest to complete entire course successfully, or retain ball between them for furthest distance-number of markers passed and not knocked over counts for scoring.
