In Italy it's called "Giochi Senza Frontiere", in West Germany, "Spiele ohne Grenzen", in Yugoslavia, "Igre Dre Meja" and in France, "Jeux sans Frontieres". Here in Britain the competition is also known as "Jeux sans Frontieres", but when this immensely popular T.V. series began 15 years ago this summer, the BBC called it "It's a Knockout" and the name has now become a household word to millions of viewers.

Since April this year twenty one teams from British towns have been competing for European honours in both the BBC and European series.

The battle began in the Midlands on Easter Monday when Ashfield and Rushcliffe took on their host, Newark, in the town square.

Seven British heats and eight European contests later, the 1980 season will culminate in the International Final at Namur in Belgium. A gold trophy awaits the winner at Namur – could it be Arun?

The complex planning operation between the BBC, the European networks and the teams which led to the staging of the Avisford Park event began many months ago when Producer, Geoff Wilson, first sorted through dozens of possible sites throughout Britain.

Having decided on Avisford Park, Production Assistants, Alan Wright and George Clarke, began the first of numerous meetings with Arun organisers Colin Wallace, Ned Wayne and Tony Baker to discuss detailed arrangements.

The basis for the 1980 British Heat had now begun to take shape, all that remained was for BBC engineering manager, Geoff Lomas and designer Stuart Furber to visit the site and assess any technical problems which had still to be surmounted.

Stuart Furber and Geoff Lomas may not be household names like Stuart Hall and Eddie Waring – but they are every bit as important in the "It's a Knockout" set up. Stuart designs all the games used in the programme while Geoff is responsible for the entire engineering contribution.

Although Stuart has been with the programme since 1969 he always manages to come up with an exciting series of games.

"I usually lock myself away in my little office and start thinking. If my mind is switched on I can get ideas anywhere – even in the bath or loo".

EDDIE WARING

Eddie Waring is the true veteran of "It's a Knockout". This is the fifteenth series of the programme, and Eddie has appeared in them all. He's presented Knockout from places as far afield as Aviemore in the North of Scotland, and St. Ives in Cornwall.

But although the programme's format has remained basically unchanged since those early days in 1966, Eddie feels the programme has evolved: "It's a Knockout has come a long way since I first arrived on Morecambe Sands after a hectic flight back from Australia to take part in the opening programme. The domestic heats have become more serious with three towns competing against each other instead of two. It has also become more sophisticated – especially with the advent of the European heats".

Apart from opening the programmes with Stuart, Eddie's role in the British heats features a blow-by-blow account of the marathon which can be a vital tie-breaker in a tight contest.

Eddie is a Yorkshireman and proud of it. He was born in Dewsbury. In his youth he played soccer, rugby union and, of course, rugby league. And for the past thirty years he has become a household name covering the latter of the BBC. In the course of his professional duties, he has made eight trips around the world, and has appeared on T.V. in Australia, New Zeland and the United States. But summertime is "It's a Knockout" time, and as Eddie says: "The programme still has national appeal . . . and I still enjoy being involved with it".

STUART HALL

Stuart Hall describes himself as the Ringmaster of "It's a Knockout". It's a unique event", he says, "but laughter is the only reason why I'm here". It's Stuart's eighth year of encouraging the competitors, entertaining the crowd of spectators, and ensuring that viewers at home are kept up with the action. Knockout is played at venues both here and abroad, which gives him a very tight schedule as he also presents the nightly regional programme "Look North West" and appears regularly on BBC's Nationwide. His enthusiastic interest in football is reflected in his Radio 2 World Service football commentaries.

Stuart was born in Ashton-under-Lyne. He now lives in Glossop where he has a collection of clocks, musical boxes, paintings and vintage and veteran cars and motor cycles. "I've got a long-standing ambition", he says, "to open a museum for children where everything they can see is in working order".

GEOFF WILSON (Producer)

Geoff Wilson has been involved with "It's a Knockout" in a variety of roles for almost ten years. The show has made its mark on him personally as well as professionally, because it was through "Knockout" that he met his wife.

Geoff joined BBC Radio in 1963. He worked on "The Archers" in Birmingham before joining the television service. He's been based in London, Wales and East Anglia and worked all over the country as an outside broadcast Stage Manager. That could mean working with Tony Bennett and Petula Clark one day and sharing life on the Ark Royal the next.

Geoff first worked on "Knockout" in 1971 as Stage Manager. Then a move to entertainment programmes in the north saw him in the role of Production Assistant. From 1975 he directed the show and this season on the task of Producer.

KNOCKOUT BAND

The Marching Ambassadors and M.A. Emeralds Colour Guard

The Marching Ambassadors Band, formed in 1909 and thought to be the oldest in the country, consists of 70 playing members who are all active Scouts. The M.A. Emeralds Colour Guard was formed two years ago and is currently made up of 29 girls between ten and eighteen years of age. The Band were National Scout Band Supreme Champions 1976/77 and British Marching Band Champions in 1978/79. They also hold over 200 other championship awards and have played in a variety of settings ranging from BBC TV's "Blue Peter" to the Royal Tournament in London.

SUMMER MAGIC FESTIVAL



All the fun, colour, excitement and magic of Eurovision's highly popular "Jeux sans Frontieres" series spills over into a mammoth four-day action-packed festival when Europe's zaniest games come to Avisford Park near Arundel in West Sussex in July.

The organisers "something for all the family" programme perfectly complements the international version of BBC TV's "It's a Knockout", being filmed for viewers throughout the world from this otherwise tranquil setting on the edge of the sunny South Downs.

Starting on Sunday, July 20th, the festival – described as the most colourful attraction on the South Coast this summer – will feature sky-diving teams, motor cycle and aerobatic displays, Medieval jousting tournaments, military bands, hot air balloons, equestrian and motor events, a professional wrestling tournament and many many more attractions – especially for the children.

The international television heat will see eight countries – Arun will represent Great Britain – battling for a place in the European Grand Final of these modern T.V. Olympics; France, West Germany, Italy, Yugoslavia, Belgium, Switzerland, Portugal and Great Britain.

"Each day will not only be a complete day out for the family but a holiday in itself," says the event Promotions Manager, Ned Wayne. "You can browse around, watch the shows, visit the trade stands from noon until dusk – and all for only 75 pence. Even car and coach parking will be free!!"

The "Jeux sans Frontieres" competition bursts into action on Monday with a lighthearted run through the games by the competing countries. The cost of entry to the special arena on this occasion will be 50 pence. On Tuesday (tickets £2.50), there will be a full dress rehearsal followed on Wednesday (tickets £3.50) by the television recording of the competition. Both the rehearsals and the competition will be compèred by that ever popular duo Eddie Waring and Stuart Hall.

CHILDREN UNDER 5 YEARS OF AGE FREE



The three towns in the ARUN holiday area are representative of the attractions and variety of Sussex. Arundel, an old town with a medieval castle, nestles in the beautiful hills of the South Downs.

Bognor Regis was designed and built as a seaside resort in the early 19th century. Littlehampton, situated at the mouth of the river ARUN, with its natural harbour, developed from a fishing and trading port to a modern leisure and tourist resort.

Tourist accommodation can be found in each of these three centres—from seaside hotels to country inns, holiday camps to woodland chalets. Each has its own shops and shopping centres; Arundel boasts a number of fine antique shops. Car parking is plentiful—although it does tend to be crowded close to the beaches during the summer.

ARUN, named after the great river which divides it, is the holiday area of West Sussex. With its seaside and countryside, its history and its sporting facilities, it offers everything for the holidaymaker who wishes to stay in one area.

However, it is also ideally placed for the tourist who wishes to see places. Easy to reach from London, the Midlands, the Channel ports and Gatwick Airport, it is equally central for those who wish to visit the many attractions in South East and Southern England. London with all its high cost overcrowded accommodation is but an hour and a half away by train. Chartwell, Beaulieu, Leeds Castle, Marwell Zoo and a host of other tourist attractions are all within a day's trip away.

The ARUN holiday area is a mixture of shoreline and picturesque countryside.



Fourteen miles of sandy beaches and a climate envied by many ensure that this part of the South Coast offers the best in seaside holidays. Well established beaches with developed facilities, beach huts, cafes and restaurants can be found at Littlehampton and Bognor Regis. Less frequented with the simplest of facilities, the beaches of Climping and Pagham offer just as much sun and sea.

The high rolling hills of the South Downs offer the ideal environment for country lovers. The South Down Way, a long distant footpath, runs along the highest ridges, giving unequalled views over the Weald to the North and the Channel to the South. Picnic sites, car parks, picturesque drives are all to be found in the area. For those who follow particular country pursuits, riding stables offer pony trekking facilities, the Arundel Wildfowl Trust provides an interest to all bird lovers and a Ramblers Bus is available to the weary walker.


Dominating the River ARUN valley is the great castle of Arundel. The ancestral home of the Dukes of Norfolk, it is now open to the public on most days during the summer months. Its medieval history is complemented by the older history of the Roman Villa at Bignor and the Roman Palace at Fishbourne. Nearby Chichester still retains the street layout of its Roman inhabitants and has many reminders of every era since. Modern times will be remembered by its world famous Festival Theatre.

To illustrate the whole range of the history of the area, the Weald and Downland Open Air Museum at Singleton presents a singular display of the buildings and houses of the past.


Medieval Jousting


Jousting reappeared in Britain in 1966 when Geoff and Val Winship produced a Jousting Tournament Show, which inspired them to form companies to tour Britain and Europe, which today proves to be one of the most popular outdoor attractions.

The original Knights were horse soldiers, their tournaments originated in France in the 12th century. They soon became a spectacular feature of chivalry which was a medieval code of Knights behaviour, with emphasis on personal honour, courage and defence of the weak. Thorough training of man and beast was essential, to hold a shield weighing fifteen pounds in the left hand and a twelve foot lance in the right hand and charge over uneven ground to hit another man demanded much expertise. To keep themselves fit to fight for religious and moral principles Knights frequently participated in mock battles or tournaments.

Today's Knights are also very experienced horsemen and know exactly how to fall from a horse or engage in combat without injury to themselves or others. However the danger of the unforseen is always present.

Pony Club Mounted Games

Every year Pony Club members from all over the country train teams of ponies and young riders under 15 years old to compete in the Prince Philip Cup mounted games competition. Practice sessions begin as early as January to prepare competitors for their ultimate goal, the final at the Horse of the Year Show in October. Competing in this event we have Cowdray, Hambledon (South), Southdown West and Petersfield, all of which have successfully reached the Zone Finals.

Scurry driving

This is the exciting and skilful event made popular on television at the Horse of the Year Show, Wembley. Ten pairs of ponies are competing including those famous Shetlands Pavlow and Peanuts, Squirrel and Nutkin and Bubble and Squeak, driven by Christine Dick, Pat Cooke and Robert Blake, who can be seen on television in October battling for the honours.

Miniature horses

Lady Fisher owns a miniature horse stud in Norfolk and she has kindly agreed to show two of her rare Falbella horses. These horses grow to a height of just 27 inches (that's 6.3 hands)! Apart from this obvious peculiarality they also have two less ribs than any other horses. They can live to about 50 years and the mares can give birth up to 40 years old. Falabellas cannot be ridden, except by very tiny children, as their bones are too fine to carry any weight, but they can pull a small cart. They have a wonderful temperament, are gentle very intelligent and quick to learn.

Heavy Horse Turnout

This event is open to singles or pairs (any breed) in harness with vehicle. Exhibitor engaged in any trade or occupation. The class will be dived into:-

- (a) Trade turnout
- (b) Farm turnout

Amongst those taking part are: Ind Coope, Young & Co., Coalite and W. A. Lidstone.

Concours d'Elegance

Open to single turnouts. The class is designed to establish the most elegant turnout.

The essence of the competition is the word 'elegance' and the winner will be the turnout which in the opinion of the judge presents the most elegant effect. This will include vehicle, horse, driver, passengers, etc., but above all the general impression. It is judged from a distance and vehicles are not closely inspected as in ordinary show classes.

Circus High School

This is a display by Vera McCleod and Richard Viner. Vera is a specialist in Circus High School, which is similar to dressage, but requires the horse to perform dance routines to music. Vera and her 20 year old hackney mare Sorrell have made many television appearances on programmes such as "That's Life", "Runaround", and Jack Hargreaves'
"Out of Town". Richard Viner, who happened to be watching the programme, so admired Vera's achievements that he couldn't resist phoning her. Since then Richard has become Vera's pupil, and accompanies her on his 7 year old thoroughbred Chanson. Vera has also worked with Max Bygraves, and Larry Grayson. Sorrell does a rather amusing impression of Larry camply crossing her legs when Vera says his name. She also mimicks Esther Rantzen's toothy grin, so it's a case of Mike Yarwood beware!!

Vera estimates it takes about 5 years for a horse to master the various dance steps such as the waltz, tango, fox trot and cha-cha-cha. Their latest venture is disco dancing, just to keep up with the times. Vera and Sorrell also perform a unique high school in harness display in a 100 year old American buggy.

Vera's patience and dedication has brought its rewards as she has travelled Europe extensively and tours the country giving demonstrations.

Royal Marines bandsmen are famed for their musical skill and smartness, not only in this country, but throughout the world.

Most people are familiar with the sight of the blue uniformed white helmeted bandsmen, who march and play with superb precision and to many, Royal Marines Bands are an important part of the national spectacle. They are also an essential ceremonial feature of the naval service and help to maintain morale and efficiency. The value of "Music while you Work" has long been recognised.

The Band of Her Majesty's Royal Marines, Flag Officer Plymouth is based in HMS Raleigh, the premier New Entry and Training Establishment of the Royal Navy, situated in Torpoint, Cornwall. At present, under the direction of Lieutenant Michael Goss, LRAM, Royal Marines, it is approximately 40 strong.

The Band's primary role is music, providing military bands, orchestras and dance bands as required by the Royal Navy in ships and establishments throughout Flag Officer Plymouth's Command. Each member of the band plays at least two instruments to enable him to fulfill his role in each musical combination and the band tours extensively throughout the United Kingdom and abroad. In addition to their musical duties, each musician is trained in a limited defence support role.

The Royal Artillery Motor Cycle Display Team

The Royal Artillery Motor Cycle Display Team has been the official display team of the Royal Regiment of Artillery since 1961. The riders, who are all trained gunners, are volunteers from service units within the Regiment, and normally spend two or three years with the team before returning to regimental duty.

The motor cycles ridden by the team are SP 370 Suzuki. Each year the team attend in the region of 40 events throughout the UK and the Continent, giving approximately 120 individual displays. This requires a high degree of fitness, concentration and professional approach on the part of each rider. The motor cycles which are maintained by our own fitters, have to be mechanically perfect at all times, as will be apparent when you see the high speed performance in the arena which allows little margin for error or the breakdown of a machine.

The Display takes the form of an opening ride of sixteen solo machines which give a breathtaking display of high speed double crossovers from the four corners of the arena followed by individual acts which include the seemingly impossible. Motor cycles are ridden backwards and from the top of a 12 foot ladder; seventeen men form a pyramid on five machines, and amongst many other acts there is some spectacular jumping over ramps. During the Finale of the Show you will see a rider jump over a car and ten motor cycles coming down from a height of some 15 feet, or a rider jumping over sixteen men. (Depending on weather conditions.) To relieve the tension of the Display the clowns amuse both the young and the not so young with their sidecar comedy act.






WATER, WATER, EVERWHERE
