

What it's all about

Harlow is acting as host to It's A Knockout in its tenth year which shows how popular the programme has become not only in Britain but also in Europe. Teams competing against Harlow today are from the Lee Valley Regional Park Authority which covers the area from Ware right down the Lee Valley to Bromley-by-Bow, and from Grays Thurrock in the south of Essex.

There are 7 domestic heats each with three teams and the winner from each programme goes into the international series which includes teams from France, Belgium, Germany, Italy, Holland and Switzerland.

For the first time this year, the seven successful British teams will also participate in a special all-winners programme to be recorded on neutral ground at Charnock Richard, Lancashire for the Radio Times Trophy.

The host for the British heat of "Jeux Sans Frontieres" will be Leeds. As it is Britain's turn to stage the grand final this year Blackpool will be the location for a Show which is expected to have a television audience around 200 million people.

There will also be another all-star celebrity edition following the success of last year's charity raising event and a cup final special with teams of

supporters from the two clubs who win through to Wembley. Cecil Korer takes over as producer this year from Barney Colehan who launched the show. Cecil said "My ambition is to put more fun back into the show. I want to revive the original concept of this series as a seaside fun show with lots of fun; in recent years it has become too competitive and serious".

"The European versions have often been crazier than ours and now we are importing some of the flavour with daft props and costumes. The bonus for the teams will be that they will have the chance to take part in European style games before 'Jeux Sans Frontieres' actually starts. British teams haven't performed so well lately. The changes we are making should alter that."

Today's winners will participate in 'Jeux Sans Frontieres' programme in Liege in Belgium on 11th August as well as the all-British winners final at Charnock Richard on 27th June. So a win today means a visit to Belgium as well as Charnock Richard and the winner at Charnock Richard means a place in the Grand Final at Blackpool in September.

The programme recorded today will be televised on Friday 11th June.

BACKGROUND AND BIOGRAPHIES

It's A Knockout has become a national institution and an international phenomenon. which communities competed against each Its roots go back more than 20 years when then producer Barney Colehan first launched

a series in the North called Top Town, in other in a studio.

Knockout was born in 1966 and has never

looked back. The following year, Europe joined in and set in motion the crazy international competition "Jeux sans Frontieres."

Knockout's inimitable duo, Stuart Hall and Eddie Waring are the commentators again and former international soccer referee Arthur Ellis is the senior referee.



EDDIE WARING

Eddie joined the programme in 1966 and has vast experience of Knockout recordings all over Europe.

He has been a top BBC personality ever since TV came to the North in 1951, becoming a household name in covering Rugby League.

Born in Dewsbury, Eddie played soccer, Rugby Union, Rugby League - and was a wrestler, too.

A globe-trotter, he has made seven trips round the world and appeared on TV in Australia, New Zealand and the U.S.

Eddie usually gives a special blow-by-blow account of the mini-marathon contest, which can be a vital tie-breaker in a tight contest. "For me", he says, "the programme really comes alive when we go into Europe. The atmosphere is electric, the competition intense, and yet so enjoyable. It's an exciting show to do."



STUART HALL

Stuart Hall, who made his Knockout debut in 1972, presents Look North, the BBC North West weeknight TV magazine programme in Manchester, and makes frequent appearances on the network in Nationwide.

A Lancashire lad, he first broadcast in 1958 as a radio contributor in Sports Spotlight. He has reported on soccer, cricket, tennis, motor racing and motor cycling, as well as current affairs.

His great loves are football, fast cars and antique clocks. Perhaps the clocks reign supreme — he loves their sense of continuity.

Married the same year he started broadcasting - 1958 - Stuart has two teenage children, Francesca and Daniel. His home in Glossop, Derbyshire, is crammed with antique clocks, Victorian furniture, bronzes and old portraits.

He sees Knockout as essentially a "fun show" and is determined to make it as entertaining as possible for competitors and viewers.



ARTHUR ELLIS

Arthur Ellis, from Halifax, one of the best-known soccer referees in the world, has officiated in practically every country that plays first-class football.

He refereed World Cup ties and 73 internationals in his time, and became the first English referee to be awarded the Gold Badge of FIFA.


He now works as a brewery representative.

THE BACKROOM BOYS

Behind the scenes, there's a dedicated team that the Knockout live audiences see going about their complex duties, but are discreetly out of sight of the TV audiences.

The director is Geoff Wilson, who makes sure that the producer's and engineers' efforts reach the screen in the way they were envisaged in the calm of the planning meetings.

Cecil has the assistance of Alan Wright. and Alan Walsh who lead the full-time workers responsible for the months of advance preparation which go into the smooth running of the series.



CECIL KORER Producer

Cecil joins the series as producer this year, but he is by no means unfamiliar with the programme. He worked on the first two series in 1966 and 1967 as an assistant producer. Since then, he's been involved with such shows as Children Talking as director, and producer of such quizzes as Password and Ask the Family.

In recent years, he has worked in London, but returned to the North - he was born in Stockport — in the Autumn of 1975 to take over Knockout from Barney Colehan and develop other programme ideas from Leeds.

He has worked on the production team of such other long-running favourites as Top of the Pops and The Good Old Days, where he first established his working relationship with Barney.

Engineering manager Geoff Lomas ensures that all the complicated equipment functions correctly, and the stage managers, led by Bryan Chapman, can be seen racing backwards and forwards talking to the director's mobile control room, via 'walkie talkie' radios during the course of the recording.



We take it from there. Because in the development of Britain's oil resources, a first in one field almost inevitably leads to fresh demands in another. We regard this as one of the facts of life, and we welcome it. It has tended to keep us out in the front of the game.





3 teams/1 heat 3 males, 1 female

A total of 3 men, walking on stilts, go in turn to collect a bunch of balloons from the end of a course, over which they negotiate various surfaces.

As each man returns he hands the balloons to a girl from his team to hold passing over his stilts to the next man for him to collect more balloons.

The winning team will be the one with most bunches of balloons collected within time limit.



1 team/3 heats 1 male, 1 female

One man and one girl with a net slung between them, walk along two poles. The man, who leads, picks up a number of balls, throwing them back into the net which must be kept reasonably taut to avoid knocking the skittles placed in between the balls.

The winning team will be the one to pick up all the balls without knocking any skittles over.

Steady Alands

2 teams/2 heats 1 male, 1 female — playing 2 males - operating revolve

One man and one girl standing on the centre of the revolve, take buckets of water from an adjacent stand and pour the contents into a container, down a suitable channel, whilst the opposing team of 2 men operate the revolve.

The winning team will be the one with most water collected within time limit.

Same 8 Net-ball

3 teams/1 heat 2 males, 1 female


Two men using poles, each push a ball off a high net and then scramble through two tubes with them.

After negotiating the first tube they climb out and sound the horn before entering the second tube, from which they emerge to hand the ball to a girl from the same team to place in a container. Each man returns to collect more balls in the same way.

The winning team will be the one which collects most balls correctly within time limit.




2 teams/2 heats 5 males, 3 females - playing 2 males - poperating revolve

One man and one girl standing on centre of revolve, throw hoops out to knock the balls off the top of sticks members of their team positioned on podiums are holding.

When the balls have been knocked off the sticks are held so as to catch and retain as many hoops as possible.

The winning team will be the one with most hoops caught correctly within time limit.



3 teams/1 heat 1 male

One man wearing a costume in which one arm is free walks along a course, first bursting balloons on stands using a fly swat, then using his feet to jump on them. He signifies finishing the course by sounding the hooter.

The winning team will be the one who completes the course guickest.



2 teams/1 heat 1 male

One man standing on a podium takes cushions from a pile, to stack them on a palette, using a long handled lifting shovel for transferring them.


The winning team will be the one with most cushions stacked on the palette within time limit.



3 teams/1 heat 3 males, 2 females


One girl takes sacks up to 2 men on roller skates, who then carry them up the track to pass them to a man and a girl from their team standing on an air tube on which they build the highest stack of sacks possible. The winning team will be the one with the highest stack of sacks built within time limit.






3 teams/3 heats 1 male, 1 female

One girl armed with a pair of cymbals has to catch and burst a number of balloons thrown to her by a man from her team walking along two poles (as used in Marathon 1) between which the balloons are placed. The winning team will be the one to burst most balloons correctly within time limit.





The Lee Valley Bark Jeam

The Lee Valley Park team in today's contest, which has been picked from users of the Lee Valley Regional Park's sporting and leisure facilities in London, Essex and Hertfordshire, has been trained to peak condition at Picketts Lock Centre in Edmonton, Britain's biggest leisure complex.

And only last weekend, team members travelled to the Army's gruelling assault course at Aldershot to be put through their paces on fitness equipment designed for commandos.

More than 200 people who use the Lee Valley Regional Park's facilities originally applied to be in the team, and the best thirty-five were picked three months ago to train as a squad. The applicants came from all walks of life, and occupations varied from a policeman and a butcher to a social worker and a female bricklayer.

The Lee Valley Regional Park's sports and leisure centres are being established along 23 miles of the valley of the River Lee, from Ware in Hertfordshire to Bromley-by-Bow in East London. Attractions include riding, cycling, sailing, entertainment, and cruiser and chalet holidays.

The Park is under the control of a unique organisation, the Lee Valley Regional Park Authority, which was set up by Parliament nine years ago to do the job.

Picketts Lock Centre in Edmonton, where the Lee Valley Park team was picked and trained, was the Authority's first major development and opened in 1973. It provides dozens of different recreational activities for all age groups, including a very wide range of sports.

A two-court sports hall, seven-rink indoor bowls hall, all-weather outdoor pitches, a fully-equipped gymnasium, 25-metre indoor rifle range, eight squash courts and a nine hole, par 32 golf course are among its facilities.


The Lee Valley Park team which competes today has used Picketts Lock Centre extensively for training in a programme which has included no less than fifty hours of organised coaching.

The Thurrock Jean

More than 300 people responded to the news that Thurrock had been selected to take part in It's A Knockout . . . and set the selectors a mammoth task in picking those to come to Harlow.

Mr. Terry Lax, the Council's Swimming Pools Manager, and star rugby player for Thurrock RUFC, took charge of a "Mini-Olympics" at Grays, from which the squad of 25 was chosen.

Said Terry: "We were not looking for top athletes but for those with all-round ability at games. We devised a series of tests; balancing, ability to throw and catch and other necessary aptitudes.

"But basically we set out to enjoy ourselves and if we should be lucky enough to win — so much the better"

The detailed training came under the experienced eye of Jack Benton an Essex County Coach. The programme was to cover the requirements needed of strength, suppleness and stamina. David Chawner, of the Thurrock Sports Council, has also been helping

to train the team together with fellow athlete Ron Bold.

All members of the team live in the Thurrock area which has Grays as the administrative centre. Better known is the port of Tilbury which is one of the largest handlers of freight in Britain.


Although the riverside has a heavy concentration of industry there is much countryside within the 64 square miles of the Borough.

The Captain, Lt.B. Ashton is sending a team of cheer-leaders who immediately volunteered.


Other places in Thurrock from which today's squad live are: Stanford-le-Hope, Corringham, Chadwell St. Mary and Horndon-on-the-Hill.




